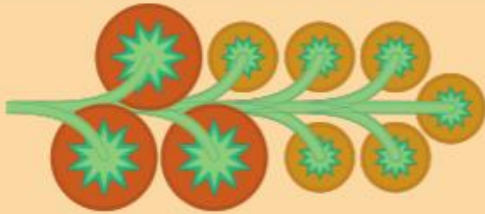

## Equality in Food Sharing and Saving:

This Webinar will be about how we can encounter inequality in our work and the involved communities. These inequalities can reach from gender, culture, religion, age or disabilities. We want to know how we can overcome our own biases in our work and find ways to acknowledge and address such issues.

### Summary of the Presentation

Together with other friendly organizations and collectives involved in the social solidarity economy and/or in social services, we would like to start a community garden that could be used as a place for gathering with others, therapy or meeting with their clients. The space would be used by members of various marginalized groups (such as folks with addictions, experience of homelessness, tough social and economic situations, and/or refugees and Roma people with their children) who often don't have access to similar public or community spaces and to a good-quality, organic food. The space could have different functions - community garden for those looking for gardening, space for cultural and community events, and a space for workshops and working with people from marginalized groups.

We are also thinking about a shared/community kitchen or a community store with products from different countries or prepared by refugees and migrants.

## Breakout - Session

### Challenge of the speaker

When designing new projects (such a community gardens, a space for cultural and community events) how can we make sure that different marginalized groups have equal access to it?

### Three Solutions

Ownership: ask the community and diverse groups and people that participate in your activities, share ownership of making decisions with others; open space and sessions to discuss these ideas, connect with other organisations that tackle other issues e.g. homelessness, mental health, education

(Access)ability of Resources: consider your resources e.g.





**CULTIVATE**

infrastructure, logistics, volunteers! Access to land or buildings can be tricky, e.g. is the land accessible (outskirts)

Starting small: Setting up a community kitchen for some days is not too difficult (use existing facilities); this could be a start for further ideas



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
